LIONS SAFETY

Have noticed that Lions members and partners who are working at barbeques are not wearing the correct footwear.

All members, partners and others assisting should be wearing fully enclosed footwear when working on a Lions barbeque. This is mandatory when working on a Bunnings Barbeque as they have done a full risk assessment into safe work practices when working on their barbeques. Note with Bunnings if this practice is not followed that organization will be banned from future Bunnings barbeques. Thus, I strongly recommend that this practice should be mandatory for all Lions Club barbeques in Lions Club International District 201V6.

The same practice should apply when providing tea and coffee at any Lions Club event due to the risk due to the boiling water.

GMT Report

members or -34 (last report: 1,030 members or -24), having added 66 members and dropped 100 since July 1st. During the month of February two new members were added however eight were dropped. Congratulations to Gunbower and Walla Walla who inducted a new

member during February.

The club health assessment for our District through January 2025 reported that nineteen like any more information. clubs had year to date positive net growth, nineteen clubs had negative growth, and seventeen clubs were status quo. Sixty percent of our clubs have less than twenty members. Twenty clubs in our District have less than fifteen members with eleven of those clubs below ten members. Regarding membership growth the standouts to date have been Cobram (+4), Moama (+3), Wangaratta (+3) and Myrtleford (+3).

Regarding Multiple District and bearing in mind our "Big Audacious Mission" (BAM) to reach 30,000 members by 2030, as of February 28th, the Multiple District has 21,779 or net -258 (my last report: 21,717 members or net -320) with 1,747 added and 2,005 dropped since July 1st. Seven of the seventeen districts are not in transition. Our MD 201 Big Audacious Mission (BAM) membership challenge is net gain +1150/ year, 24 new clubs and 1 member/club/year.

For our V6 District to get out of transition and get to the 1,250 figure we will now need to recruit 230 members or four new members per club net. As stated in my last report, we continue

to head in a downward slide that has been ongoing for nearly a decade. If all our clubs As of February 28th, in V6 we have 1,020 could finish the current year net +1 it would make a huge difference!

Fruit Fly Project

Local fruit producers, whether large scale or backyard growers, are being invited to provide information to guide the next phase of fruit fly education and eradication programs in the region.

The Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Project campaign - called No Flies on Us! - runs across several local councils, including Berrigan Shire.

Through a new survey, the groups want to gauge your understanding of how to manage Queensland Fruit Fly and who is responsible for backyard gardens, commercial crops and public lands.

"Your response will help us to deliver fruit fly awareness, education and engagement

strategies more effectively across the Goulburn Murray Valley region," a spokesperson said.

Queensland fruit fly attack and damage a wide range of fruit and vegetables, and is recognised as a serious pest. When fruit is attacked it is inedible.

While the Queensland fruit fly is native to eastern Queensland and north-eastern NSW, the prevalence of hosts in Queensland, Northern Territory, NSW and Victoria has expanded the area in which it is found. Fruit fly activity generally increases in spring as the weather gets warmer, however is not restricted to a particular season.

Outbreaks have the potential to limit production for growers and result in reduced income through lost trade opportunities.

It is essential that people take a range of measures to help control fruit fly, rather than relying on one single action.

The Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Project was established with the belief that successful management of fruit fly is a community effort.

The Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Project region is 16,354km² and encompasses the five local government areas of Greater Shepparton City Council, Campaspe, Moira, Strathbogie and Berrigan Shires, servicing a population of 150,067 people.

Since the project's inception in 2017, the region has recorded a significant decrease in fruit fly trapped through the project's extensive trapping grid.

Key milestones include an 83 per cent reduction of the fruit fly population in the township of Cobram, and a 60 per cent reduction in the fruit fly population across the Goulburn Murray Valley region.

The group has also administered workshops to more than 14,000 participants, implemented education programs in schools and forged important partnerships to continue their education and eradication aims.

Skin Scan Van - The Lions Club of Wangaratta Skin





Operations report

January 6th – 10th, 2025 Lions Sponsored Camps

From January 6th to 10th, 2025, Licola Wilderness Village hosted a Lions Sponsored Camp, welcoming 50 children from Southern New South Wales and Eastern Victoria districts. This camp marked a significant milestone, as it had been quite some time since children from these border communities had the opportunity to attend.

Throughout the week, the children participated in a wide range of engaging outdoor activities, including team-building challenges, adventure courses, canoeing, and bushcraft workshops. For many, it was a chance to experience the beauty of the Victorian high country, forge new friendships, and build confidence in a supportive and encouraging environment.

The Lions Clubs of the participating districts played a crucial role in making this camp possible, providing sponsorship that covered accommodation, meals, activities, and transport assistance for those in need. Their ongoing support continues to ensure that children from diverse backgrounds can access this life-changing camp experience, especially those who might not otherwise have the opportunity.

One interesting trend we've observed over the past few years is a significant shift in the activities that children gravitate toward during camp. Traditionally, our high-adrenaline attractions - such as the flying fox and giant swing - were the undisputed favorites, drawing long queues of eager participants. However, more recently, we've noticed a growing preference for Arts & Crafts, with many children choosing to immerse themselves in creative expression over thrill-seeking adventures.

This shift appears to be influenced by the fact that most, if not all, of our campers have previously attended facilities offering similar high-ropes, zip lines and climbing courses. As a result, the novelty of these experiences has diminished for some, making the calmer, more creative spaces at camp increasingly appealing.

Our Arts & Crafts sessions provide campers with a hands-on, personalized experience, allowing them to explore painting, sculpting, woodwork, and jewellery-making, among other creative activities. These sessions foster mindfulness, self-expression, and social bonding, offering a different kind of challenge - one that is intrinsic and personal rather than physical and external.

While adventure-based activities remain a core part of our camp experience, this evolving trend has encouraged us to expand our creative offerings to better cater to the changing interests of our campers. We see this as an opportunity to provide a more balanced and enriching camp experience, ensuring that every child - whether an adrenaline-seeker or an artist at heart - finds a space where they can thrive and grow.

The Lions Sponsored Camp (LSC) Coordination Team would like to extend a huge thank you to Darren Laffan from the the newly established Licola Lions Club for his outstanding support in managing the logistics of transporting children to camp. His dedication and planning ensured the smooth and safe transport of campers traveling from Lockington, Echuca, and Rochester to Shepparton, playing a crucial role in making this camp experience possible for these children. Coordinating transport for a large group of campers is no small feat.

Lions Clubs Correspondence

With the introduction of our updated application process and digital forms, which are now sent via email with attached links, we have noticed an emerging challenge- many Lions Clubs are not regularly checking their emails, sometimes going months without reviewing important correspondence.

This delay in communication has led to missed deadlines, incomplete applications, and difficulties in coordinating sponsorships and logistics for camps.

Given the critical role that timely responses play in ensuring a smooth and efficient process, we encourage all Lions Clubs to prioritize checking their emails and decision making prior to club meetings that may not align with cut off dates, this will help you to be regularly informed and engaged.

We are Encouraging clubs to assign a dedicated contact person responsible for monitoring emails and responding promptly.

We greatly appreciate the ongoing efforts of all Lions Clubs in supporting our programs, and we want to ensure that every club has the opportunity to participate fully. By improving communication habits, we can continue to provide exceptional experiences for children and families while streamlining the application process for all involved.

TO: All lions Re: Lions Category A Project - Green Canopy - Newsletter No. 1

Welcome to the first of many monthly reports to help guide you and your club through the process of participation and to provide ideas on how your club can support this wonderful yet simple project.

You are all aware that the Lions Green Canopy Project was passed at the Darwin Convention. It has taken time for the Council of Governors to get a suitable team together to develop this brand new Lions project. We are now in place and are preparing for the official launch at the Multiple District Convention at Traralgon in May this year.

Like all projects clubs undertake, it takes time to formulate an appropriate plan and to put that plan into action.

Our suggestions will hopefully provide you with the reassurance and support needed, to participate and nurture this ongoing project.

WHERE CAN WE PLANT OUR NATIVE TREES?

Now is the time to look at the options available. Some city clubs have concerns that they cannot participate due to the lack of options. I disagree!! Each and every council area, whether city or country orientated, have areas of concern that require attention. Whilst they annually have budgets to cover the supply of suitable trees, many regions have limited options when it comes to labour to plant those trees.

Keep in mind these suitable areas are not limited to council areas. Landholders, retirement villages, homeowners and developers alike, are increasingly aware of the needs our our environment. Greening of new land developments or growing a green corridor through their properties are now high on their agendas. We are therefore only limited by our imagination as to the areas available.

WHAT DO WE PLANT?

There are several factors to consider here. We need natives or others suitable to the particular area. For example a wet gully area in the city limits may require trees and/or shrubs able to absorb large quantities of water and be alkaline resistant. A rural outlook is better suited with drought resistant varieties and tolerant of a clay soil. There are varieties that are suitable to almost any soil type you may encounter. These are all issues to consider when selecting plants.

WHO DO WE TALK TO?

Most of us do not have the knowledge to select suitable plants therefore we must seek the assistance of a person suitably qualified to guide us in the selection. Choices here are endless. Nurseries, council garden staff, horticulturists, town community nurseries, Landcare groups etc. etc. For larger city areas consideration could be given to working with the local botanical garden leaders who are there to assist where possible.

WHAT WILL IT COST MY CLUB?

It may cost you nothing other than your labour or administration of the project. Companies large and small enthusiastically promote the sponsorship of environmental projects, particularly in their local areas. Mining companies are required to submit a proposal on how they will rejuvenate areas after mining when applications are submitted to councils.

WE ARE TOO OLD TO DO THE LABOUR PART OF IT, WHAT DO WE DO?

Many of our clubs tend to have members who, due to age, are limited in what can be done manually. This is the ideal opportunity to form partnerships with numerous options available. Schools, family, councils, other clubs, scouts, girl guides, Landcare groups, environmental bodies, social clubs, ethnic groups, senior citizens clubs. The list is endless.

WHEN DO WE PREPARE THE SOIL, PLANT THE TREES AND WHAT THEN?

There will be variations state to state and area to area. However, as we progress with our reports, we will attempt to provide suggestions to assist you.
