Farmers are left stranded

Farming communities will pay the price when funding for a critical program to control the Queensland Fruit Fly runs dry, a local MP has warned.

Since its genesis in 2017-18, the Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Program has been instrumental in suppressing numbers of QFF, a serious pest that devastates yields by laying its eggs in fruit and vegetables.

But that's set to end should the Victorian Government not renew its funding of the program beyond June this year.

State Member for Ovens Valley Tim McCurdy said since funding began, the program had slashed QFF numbers by 95 per cent.

- "But ongoing cuts have seen monitoring traps fall from over 400 to just 200" he said.
- Growers were fed up with the uncertainty and lack of long-term support from the government over the issue, Mr McCurdy said.

"Our growers are already doing it tough. They don't need more uncertainty. The government needs to stop gambling with regional jobs and livelihoods" he said.

Instead, Mr McCurdy is pushing for the government to commit continued funding for the program in its next budget, to be handed down in May.

"I stand with our growers, and I'll keep pushing for the funding they deserve. This is about protecting crops, securing jobs and backing the people who feed our state," he said.

The government did not respond to questions asking whether it would commit funding in the May budget to continue the management program.

A spokesperson said the government had invested \$14.3 million to empower industry and home gardeners to embed fruit fly management in their communities - improving community and landholders' understanding of how to best manage fruit flies on their property, placing them in the good position to limit the impact of the pest moving forward.

Within days, vacancies at the Cancer van were filled, although we were able to cater for all late bookings. Over the weekend, some 124 people were checked for skin cancers. All lesions are considered suspect until proven by

further investigations. Screening was carried out by trained medical staff who volunteered their time. We had two doctors and a senior nurse trained in skin cancer on duty, as well as administrators and our team of friendly Lions.

Alarmingly, 54% of those attending were referred for further investigation. Eleven were identified as having life threatening lesions. In this case, it was certainly a worthwhile project, one which we hope to repeat in two years time

We would like to thank for Tungamah Hotel for accommodation and meals and to the General Store for lunches. Central Murray Bank were terrific sponsors and all Lions worked hard to make it a great weekend. Administrator Paul Shortis did a great job, as did Harry who drove the bus. Most of all, thank you to the locals who came along.

More Lions work revolve around providing benches around the town for those who need a break during their daily walk. This is only the start of an ongoing project and it is great to have the Moira Shire and Men's Shed on board with a great project. The club was involved last weekend with catering for car racing out at Wilby. This was a 2 day event and the whole weekend's food was sold out by lunchtime on the first day. There was lots of chasing around to get more food and also change. We are all so very proud of our band of workers who did so well. Michelle and Helen organised the weekend and boy were they proud, as well as so exhausted.

GMT Report

As of April 28th, in V6 we have 1,017 members or -37 (last report: 1,025 members or -29), having added 81 members and dropped 118 since July 1st. During the month of April three new members were added and nine were dropped. Congratulations to Albury, Rochester, and Echuca for inducting new members during April.

The club health assessment for our District through March 2025 reported that nineteen clubs had year to date positive net growth, twenty clubs had negative growth, and sixteen clubs were status quo. Sixty percent of our clubs have less than twenty members. Twenty clubs in our District have less than fifteen members with eleven (ten last report) of those clubs below members. ten Regarding membership growth the standouts through March have been Wodonga (+7), Cobram (+4), Wangaratta (+3), Myrtleford (+3), Bright (+2), Lockhart (+2), Moama (+2), Rochester (+2), Tungamah (+2), and Yarrawonga (+2).

Regarding Multiple District and bearing in mind our "Big Audacious Mission" (BAM) to reach 30,000 members by 2030, as of April 28th, the Multiple District has 21,886 members or net -151 (my last report: 21,852 members or net -185) with 2,252 added and 2,403 dropped

since July 1st. Seven of the seventeen districts are not in transition. Re membership growth - six of eighteen districts are net positive. Our MD 201 Big Audacious Mission (BAM) membership challenge is net gain +1150/year, 24 new clubs and 1 member/club/year.

For our V6 District to get out of transition and get to the 1,250 figure we will now need to recruit 233 members (my last report: 225 members) or just over four new members per club net. Our net growth remains in negative figures, and our net position regrettably has worsened since my last report. Over the remaining couple of months of DG Julie's term, we need to keep the drops to a minimum and focus on recruiting new members.

There are many great membership resources available on the LCI and Lions Australia websites. One of the key membership resources found in the Club Membership e-Book is: "Just Ask! – Fostering a culture of recruitment" guide. I encourage you to contact me if you would like any more information.



The Leo of the Year was Chuck from Victoria and the Public Speaking winner was Hope from West Australia. Our future is in good hands I believe!



Thank you for the generosity of your Lions Club towards this appeal.

This is a walker presented by ALCMF to a very excited little girl. Meet young Ela! Just to see the face of her mother when she was fitted and moved off on her trip with a Mobility Walker was priceless! This child was grinning from ear to ear and singing" Happy Birthday" a gift never dreamed it was possible. It becomes quite a process. A harness is fitted so that so if she had a loss of balance or her legs failed, she would not fall onto the floor but would be able to regain her balance and head off again.

In our V & T Districts we have stopped supporting this project and it has slipped away! Thankfully all other Districts in Australia have elected to assist to supply any walker requests that have been sort after to ensure that these energetic young people have received their required walker.


It is also admirable nice to see that a lot of the stamp collection funds goes to help this project.

INAUGURATION OF INCUCYTE LIVE CELL IMAGING PLATFORM AT ST VINCENT'S INSTITUTE (SVI) IN MELBOURNE

The Lions Australia Diabetes Foundation was pleased to be represented by Trustee & Secretary Lion Stephen at a special celebration on 26 March 2025 at SVI to mark the inauguration of the Incucyte platform. The platform was jointly funded by LADF and other Lions foundations, the Lions of District 201V1-4 and a private donor. The cost of the platform was around a quarter of a million dollars.

The platform is capable of analysing up to 6 samples of living cells at one time, thus showing the changes in the cell over a period.
