Dave and Phyll came from Melbourne to Albury where he conducted a retail butcher shop in East Albury. Hence his nickname of "butch".


Both were active members of the Scottish Pipe and Drums with Dave being a drummer and Phyll

Why do Lions Quit

Brief Overview: Why Lions Are Leaving Their Clubs and How This Was Determined.

This analysis is based on a large open discussion in the Global Lions Forum, a worldwide online community of approximately 29,000 Lions. A single question — “What are the primary reasons for Lions leaving their clubs?” — generated several hundred comments and replies within a short period of time. While this was not a formal survey or random sample, the volume, diversity, and consistency of responses across countries and leadership levels make the findings highly informative. The comments were consolidated, thematically coded, and summarized by ChatGPT using qualitative analysis. The value of this data lies not in statistical precision, but in the convergence of independent voices identifying the same issues across cultures and geographies.

Two Major Reasons Lions Are Leaving

Toxic internal culture and poor relationships - This was the single most dominant theme, representing roughly 40–50 percent of substantive comments. Lions most frequently cited conflict, cliques, bullying, disrespect, favoritism, poor leadership, and unresolved misconduct as the primary reasons for leaving. These are overwhelmingly club-controllable factors. The data indicate that Lions are not leaving because of service fatigue, but because the internal club environment becomes unhealthy and emotionally unsustainable.

Failure to modernize and engage members meaningfully - The second most common theme, representing roughly 25–30 percent of comments, focused on outdated and disengaging club practices. Lions described boring or overly formal meetings, resistance to change, excessive talking and too little doing, and poor use of members' time. This theme is almost entirely within the control of individual clubs. Members were not rejecting service; they were rejecting a club experience that no longer felt relevant, efficient, or meaningful.

Methodological Summary

- Data source: Open discussion in a 29,000-member global Lions community
- Sample: Several hundred voluntary responses from multiple countries and leadership levels
- Method: Qualitative thematic coding and consolidation by ChatGPT
- Nature of data: Directional, not statistical; categories overlap and respondents cited multiple reasons
- Strength of findings: High consistency of themes across independent voices worldwide

Final Insight

Across this large and diverse population, the evidence is clear. The primary drivers of attrition are not age, death, or loss of interest in service. They are organizational and cultural failures at the club level. At least two thirds of the reasons Lions leave are within the control of clubs themselves. Retention, not recruitment, is the central challenge.

The last 20% were random things typically beyond the control of the clubs, such as health, death, moving, aging out, etc.

After over 550 comments from Lions and former Lions, we can answer the question of why Lions quit their clubs

#1 Club environment is uncomfortable (50%)

#2 Club will not allow change (30%)

What an incredible way to kick off the festive season. We can't wait do it all again next year at the Moama Christmas Carols—here's to more music, more laughter, and more community spirit!




Lavington Lions

Aussie Crunch White Chocolate Coconut Slice

Ingredients - Base:

- 1 cup rolled oats.
- 1 cup self raising flour.
- 1 cup brown sugar.
- 1 cup desiccated coconut.
- 125 g unsalted butter, melted.
- 1 tbsp golden syrup.

Topping:

- 200 g white chocolate, chopped.

Directions:

Prepare the tin:

1. Preheat oven to 180°C fan forced.
2. Line a 20 cm by 30 cm slice tin with baking paper.

Make the base:

3. In a bowl, combine the rolled oats, self raising flour, brown sugar, and desiccated coconut.
4. Add the melted butter and golden syrup, and mix until well combined.
5. Press the mixture firmly into the prepared tin.

Bake:

6. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes, until golden and firm.
7. Remove from oven and allow to cool completely in the tin.

Add the topping:

8. Melt the white chocolate gently until smooth.
9. Spread evenly over the cooled base.
10. Allow to set at room temperature or in the fridge.

Volunteer clubs relax commitments in attempt to arrest declining membership

Few items bear the proud hallmarks of grassroots fundraising like the humble barbecue. The smell of caramelising onions and the pop of sausages has helped Myrtleford's Rotary Club raise thousands of dollars from the well-worn plate of a barbecue it inherited from the local Apex Club, which folded more than a decade ago.

But the time has come for that workhorse barbecue to change hands again.

Myrtleford Rotary Club has made the tough decision to close after age ruthlessly stripped its membership down to just eight. After 72 years of operation, the group's members have faced the emotional but inevitable end. "I don't have the answer, but I do really think we need to look at how we operate, how Rotary operates, and how all service clubs operate," former member Gail Roberston said. "If the family dynamics have changed, we have to change too."

It is not clear how other clubs – many of which have served the community for decades – will continue in the changing space of volunteerism. Some members blame the advancement of technology and social media. **"Our connectivity now has just changed so dramatically – it's all in your pocket," former member Alma Adams said.** "That issue of going to meet people over a dinner ... it just doesn't happen anymore."

Recruitment struggles - The keys to the Myrtleford Rotary Club shed have been handed over to Myrtleford's Lions Club. It boasts 33 members, a relatively healthy number compared to other clubs. But recruiting remains a challenge. "We are an aging services club ... we have to find those things that we do well," said Chris Buono, Myrtleford Lions Club secretary. Tim Cossor's key role in the club is to recruit new members, and he finds a gentle approach works best for the younger generation, including losing traditional meeting obligations.

"They think it's a huge commitment," Mr Cossor said. "We just want you to do what you can do."

Staple clubs trial change - It is not a new phenomenon, with volunteer clubs across Australia struggling to recruit members in a decline accelerated by the COVID-19 pandemic. Ninety-two Rotary clubs closed between 2020 and 2025, with average membership sitting at 22, about 10 below the global average. Lions Australia has also seen membership fall over the past 15 years. Both organisations say the shift reflects changing attitudes to volunteering, with people increasingly seeking flexible, interest-based involvement. "This gives people in the community a place to meet like-minded people and make a difference in meaningful ways," Lions Australia executive officer Rob Oerlemans said.

Rotary has moved into new territory, establishing 21 clubs since 2020. "Many smaller clubs have seen their members age out or, sadly, pass away, but in recent years, the development of new-style clubs are attracting younger members," said Liz McDougall, Rotary South Pacific public image chair.

Improving the 'volunteer experience'.

The national peak body for volunteering, Volunteering Australia, said volunteering remained central to many Australian communities, but the way people volunteered had changed.

"People are just grabbing the opportunity, grabbing some friends and going and doing things that they are either interested in or need to be done without going through organisations," Volunteering Australia chief executive Mark Pearce said.

He said organised charities and clubs remained central to identifying and meeting community needs.

"In order for volunteering to survive and thrive into the future, we need to engage with volunteers in a way that makes sense to them," he said. "We need to look really closely at improving the volunteer experience."

Service Reporting...



This comment from Lion Alvin Louie really nails it: I just completed Regional Lions Leadership Training with:

- Solid curriculum
- Capable, committed instructors
- Seasoned Lions preparing for higher leadership.

Yet none of the following appeared in the formal criteria or modules:

- Toxic club culture
- Conflict avoidance and favoritism
- Bullying, cliques, and disengagement
- Resistance to change
- Emotional burnout and silent exits.

And yet...Those exact issues dominated the side conversations, hallway talk, and shared frustrations. That gap is not accidental. The Elephant in the Room.

Lions leadership training focuses heavily on:

- Structure
- Process
- Roles
- Compliance
- Tools
- Procedures

But it largely avoids self-examination of organizational dysfunction. Why? Because culture is messy. Because naming dysfunction creates discomfort. Because acknowledging failure requires humility. Because once spoken, it demands change—not just training.

So instead, the system teaches people how to operate within the structure, not how to repair what's broken inside it. Why We're Stuck at ~1.4 Million Members.

Here's the hard truth: You cannot grow an organization whose culture repels the people it recruits. Recruitment brings people in. Culture decides whether they stay. Lions keeps investing in:

- Recruiting techniques
- Leadership pipelines
- Training ladders

But it underinvests in:

- Psychological safety
- Conflict resolution
- Cultural health diagnostics
- Accountability for behavior
- Modern relevance of the club experience.

So the organization runs in place:

- New members in
- Frustrated members out
- Net zero growth.

1.4 million becomes a ceiling, not a milestone. Why Training Feels "Good" but Changes Little. The training is good. The instructors are good. The intentions are good. But the training:

- Assumes a healthy culture
- Avoids confronting power dynamics
- Doesn't challenge entrenched behaviors
- Doesn't ask why Lions quit.

So leaders graduate knowing:

- What to do
- What role they hold
- What procedures exist. But not:
- How to stop people from leaving
- How to address toxic behavior
- How to evolve club culture
- How to create belonging

The Quiet Irony. The most experienced Lions—the very people being trained—already know what's broken. They whisper it:

- at lunch
- in the parking lot
- during training.

Grants available to back rural mental health

Up to \$20,000 in funding for initiatives in farming and rural regions

14 January 2026: FRRR's [In a Good Place](#) (IAGP) program is offering grants of up to \$20,000 for community-led projects that support the mental health and wellbeing of farmers, farming communities and people living in remote, rural and regional places.

Community groups and not-for-profits (NFPs) are invited to apply for grants from a funding pool of \$200,000 for initiatives that improve mental health education, build community connections to foster wellbeing and assist local non-clinical services.

These grants are for local organisations to help their community build up the knowledge, skills and networks to support their mental health and wellbeing and to make sure locals know they don't need to go it alone.

Jill Karena, Head of Granting at FRRR, said when you live in the country or on a remote property, it can be especially tough to put up your hand and ask for help when you're not in the best place mentally.

"There are so many great things about living life on the land, but limited access to information, resources and services, as well as the geographical isolation, can make it particularly difficult to look after your mental health," Ms Karena said.

"This is one of the reasons why community groups are so important to the vitality of remote, rural and regional Australia. Because they are on the ground in these communities and out talking to farmers, running wellbeing programs and filling the gaps in mental health services.

"Mental health is a whole-of-community concern. This funding enables NFPs to provide locals with resources and opportunities to connect, develop skills, increase understanding and reduce stigma. They can also use the grants to create safe spaces where people can have honest conversations and be heard."

Thanks to FRRR's donor partners, there are two streams of funding available:

1. **Community wellbeing:** for projects that focus on strengthening the general mental health and wellbeing of people in remote, rural and regional communities.
2. **Farmers and farming communities:** for projects specifically supporting the mental health and wellbeing of farmers and the communities they live in.

The types of projects IAGP grants have previously funded include volunteer training in mental health first aid, community events that encourage locals to connect and feel less isolated, inviting a guest speaker to share their mental health journey and personal wellbeing strategies with the community, and setting up an accessible safe space where locals can talk about their own mental health concerns with trained peer volunteers.



“Together with our funding partners, we look forward to being inspired by the project ideas put forward by NFPs and community groups who are out on the ground, proactively supporting the mental health and wellbeing of their local community,” Ms Karena said.

FRRR will host a free, online **grantseeker workshop on Thursday, 22 January**, for NFPs and community groups wanting to learn more about the program. To register, visit FRRR’s website.

Applications are currently open and close on 19 February at 5pm AEDT. Funding will be announced late June.
