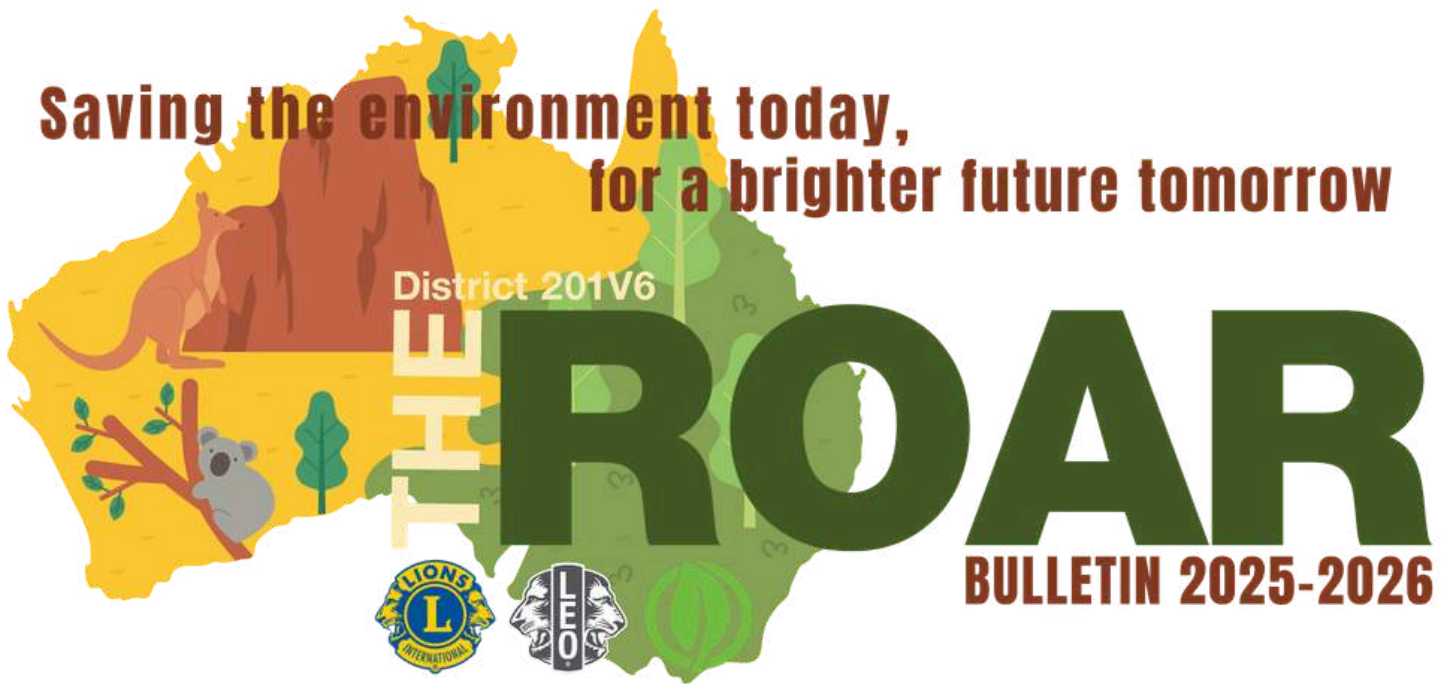

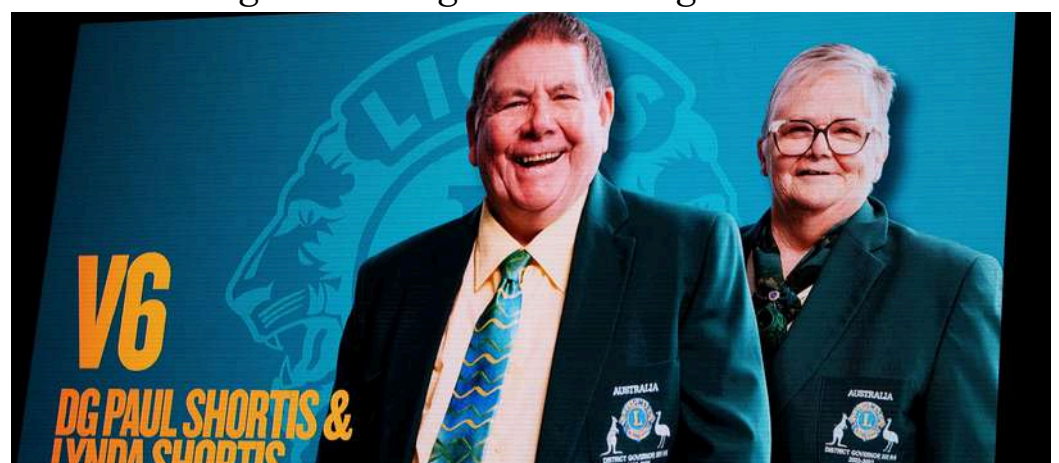

**From the DG...**

In May I attended my final Council Meeting in Adelaide – three full days of discussion, planning, and decision-making. One of the major outcomes was the passage of a motion designed to strengthen and support our clubs in recruitment, training, and long-term sustainability. The Council of Governors endorsed:

- Engaging an external consultant to assist clubs with recruitment and member development
- Multiple District financial assistance for Club Development Days and the training of club officers
- Multiple District financial assistance for the chartering of new clubs through to 30 June 2029
- Multiple District financial assistance to support the rebuilding of existing clubs through to 30 June 2029

Following the Council Meeting, Lyn and I attended the 74th Multiple District Convention, officially opened by Her Excellency the Honourable Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia.

The Convention featured several outstanding guest speakers, including:

- 3rd International Vice President Tony Benbow OAM, who reflected on his year in office and his international travels
- Lion Jarrod Kreft, who delivered an engaging and forward-looking presentation on Artificial Intelligence
- Past Council Chair Lion David Horne, Chief Executive Officer of Lions Assisted Dogs, who provided an update on the major redevelopment of the centre

There were also presentations from our various Foundations, along with a wide range of stalls showcasing their work and projects. However, the highlight of the Convention was undoubtedly the Leo of the Year and Youth of the Year finals. Their performances were exceptional, inspiring everyone present and earning well-deserved standing ovations.

As this is my final Roar report, I want to take this opportunity to sincerely thank you – our members – for the hospitality, warmth, and friendship you have shown to Lyn and me throughout our club visits.

To the Cabinet members: thank you for the time, energy, and commitment you have invested in helping to run our District. I truly believe we have started something positive, and I hope it continues to grow in the years ahead.

Once again, a heartfelt thank you to all. Lyn and I look forward to expressing our appreciation in person at the District Changeover, to be held at the Yarrowonga Golf Club on 25 July. Further information will be circulated shortly.

# Rochester Lions

The Rochester Lions Club has stepped in to operate Rochester's container collection service following the closure of the town's previous collection point, creating a new way for residents to recycle while helping fund local community projects. The service officially reopened at the Lions yard on Baynes Street, where volunteers are now assisting locals with returning bottles and cans for recycling.

Volunteers consist of not only Lions members but also several Work Experience students from the local school. The funds raised going directly back into community programs and local support initiatives rather than private profit. The project is designed to deliver both environmental and community benefits.

Since opening, the site has seen a strong response from residents, with a steady flow of people using the service in its first few weeks of operation. Volunteers are hopeful participation will continue to grow as more people learn about the convenience of the depot and the positive impact it has on the town.

The club also expects the operation to expand over time, with plans to increase the number of collection bins processed each week as demand rises. The depot operates six days a week, giving residents flexible access to recycle containers and receive refunds through cash payments, direct bank deposits, or donations back to the club.

The initiative reflects the Rochester Lions Club's ongoing commitment to environmental sustainability, community service, and supporting local projects that benefit the wider Rochester community.

This event brought together District Coordinators involved with Leadership, Service, Membership and Extension within our Lions community. Each session conducted gave participants the opportunity to be involved with discussion about improving and promoting our organisation.

The project chosen by participants was named Tech Buddy Programme, with the aim of providing technical assistance to older age group phone users who had limited or no technical knowledge. # Yarrowonga Lions

Yarrowonga Lions are incredibly proud of Debbie. Once again, she has been recognised for her dedication to our flagship project “The Made with Love Chemotherapy Turbans Project”. Every Tuesday, Debbie and the Turban Angels gather at our clubrooms to sew. So far, more than 87,000 pieces of headwear have been made and distributed across Australia and several countries. Thanks to donations of materials and freight, the project has grown significantly from its humble beginnings.

Always humble about her achievements, Debbie has also been recognised by local Bunnings Activities Manager Tim Roadley through a nomination for the Bunnings Community Legends Award. The winner will be announced on 4 June, which is also Debbie’s birthday. The overall Community Legends winner will receive a \$10,000 donation for their chosen community group or charity, a \$1,000 Bunnings voucher, and a trip for two to the Bunnings Conference.

## Community Legend nod for Debbie

In a town known for its quiet achievers, one local woman is now being recognised on a national stage for her extraordinary compassion and community service.

The overall Community Legends winner will receive a \$10,000 donation to their chosen community group or charity, along with a \$1,000 Bunnings voucher and a trip for two to the Bunnings Conference.

Debbie, founder of the Made with Love Chemotherapy Turban Angels Project, after her husband had his last day of work in 2015, she served a further benefit, a simple act of love that grew into a life-changing community movement.

Today, their investment has provided more than 87,000 handmade turbans, caps and headpieces to people undergoing cancer treatment across Australia and overseas.

Around 15 dedicated women, known as the ‘Turban Angels’, gather each Tuesday at the Yarrowonga Lions Club to sew turbans as the ‘Made with Love’ project grows.

“About 18 months ago, Debbie also began making knit kids’ inspirational headbands

Debbie said the group has become just as important as the work itself. “My girls are my life,” she said. “They are the most amazing group of women you could ever meet. Some work in hair, carrying heavy things home, but by the time they leave, they’re sending eggs. We are family.”

The overall Community Legends winner will receive a \$10,000 donation to their chosen community group or charity, along with a \$1,000 Bunnings voucher and a trip for two to the Bunnings Conference.

Debbie said the nomination was deeply humbling. “I just do what I do. I live my life, I sew, I sew to replace some of the sewing machines and supplies for my girls because they work so hard every week.”

A former cancer survivor herself, Debbie said her own journey gives her a deep understanding of those she sews for.

“I’ve walked that journey. When people send photos wearing their turbans, I know exactly what it means to them. It’s about bringing people back like themselves again,” Debbie said.

for children battling cancer, bringing bright designs and uplifting messages such as “I love you”, “Bunnings rocks”, “Cancer sucks” and “Let’s love, laugh, hug and smile through this journey, but it’s all going to end with a happy ending for everyone who has ever been here.”

Despite receiving an OAM for her service to the community through charitable contributions, along with numerous other accolades, Debbie remains firmly focused on the work and the people behind it. “It’s all about bringing people back like themselves again,” Debbie said.

“Tim Roadley said the decision to nominate Debbie was an easy one. “There’s only one person in town who sews like the rest of us,” he said. “What Debbie has created around small businesses in Yarrowonga and has now reached across Australia and into eight countries. “I can’t think of anything else locally that has grown like that or made such an impact on people’s wellbeing.”

Tim said the project’s value extended well beyond the handmade items. “It’s a double impact,” he said. “The girls are making turbans for people going through chemotherapy, but it’s also giving connections and purpose to the women who make every item. “In communities like ours, headbands can be a real issue, especially for older people. This project gives people someone to belong.”

Tim, who has worked at Bunnings-headstore since the Yarrowonga store opened nearly a decade ago, said supporting local communities was central to the company’s values. “We’re here for you. That’s what Bunnings is about, giving back to the communities we’re part of.”

The Turban Angels Project is an official Lions Club District project.

Debbie is one of 50 Community Legends recognised through the campaign, which focuses on acknowledging and rewarding local legends making a positive difference across Australia.
